Shelter-Neuter-Return (SNR)





The SNR method decreases the cat population in an area, reduces the spread of diseases, lowers euthanasia rates and allows cats to live happy lives.

The problem?

Tens of millions of outdoor community cats are rapidly breeding throughout the nation. The traditional methods of relocating or euthanizing them have not been successful, hence the current overpopulation.

Removing community cats from their areas can consequently invite other, non-sterilized cats to move in and reproduce, continuing the overpopulation problem.





The solution?

The Shelter-Neuter-Return (SNR) method is a proven way to humanely and effectively control outdoor community cat populations.

Community cats are territorial and can discourage other non-sterilized cats from joining their colony. SNR intervention can stabilize cat colony growth, eventually leading to an overall reduction in the area.

1. Shelter

Community cats are trapped and brought to our center.



2. Neuter

Next, they're sterilized, vaccinated and receive an "ear-tip" identifier.



3. Return

After recovery, they're returned to their original location.
